Habitat for Humanity: Where dreams become reality

Every Habitat home is a success story about a family in dire need.

"When a family is selected to own a home, they feel like they've won the lottery," says Paul Hensch, executive director for Taos County Habitat.

When the keys are handed to the owners, a dream becomes a reality. One little boy recently took Hensch by the hand, led him through the house and proudly exclaimed, "This is MY room!" There wasn't even a roof yet.

Habitat families include various ethnic backgrounds and personal challenges. House 25, scheduled for a spring 2009 move in, is being built to accommodate a single mother and her daughter who has special needs and significant physical challenges. Hensch says, "It's difficult to do it all on a shoestring, but it's worth the effort."

Habitat homes are built almost completely by volunteers and paid for with donations. A small, dedicated management, fundraising and part-time office staff operates on a slim budget. On site, there is one paid supervisor who instructs and manages volunteers and paid subcontractors who do jobs that require special training and certifications. Volunteers show up from all over the world to do everything from breaking ground to finishing touches. They mix cement, dig ditches, lay bricks, pour pipes,

raze and paint walls, and install insulation, cabinets and appliances. Workers get acquainted with New Mexico's arid homes and unique climate and terrain challenges.

Sixteen students from Blake High School in Minnesota worked on houses 24 and 25 during spring break. With seven years of working on Habitat homes as part of their service learning curriculum, this was their first time in Taos. Volunteers learn about the geographic construction

procure and building costs. They are exposed to local culture and learn how much they can help a needy family with a little time and effort.

"I'd say, the foreman, is our hero," said group leader Julie Rogers Bascom. "He shows the kids what to do, and then trusts them to do it. It's such a confidence builder."

Habitat for Humanity International volunteer groups, Collegiate Challenge and Global Village, continue to bring in willing workers, Hensch said. "Everyone can do something, and not everyone has to work alone. We need public

relations to help office assistants, fund raisers, event workers, and even people who bring appreciation to those appreciation for volunteers."

Great writer Bruce Armstrong added, "Eight now, we're looking for volunteer architects, engineers and those with green design and construction expertise for a Taos green development." Habitat hopes to offer 13 "self-help" homes each at once, with volunteer support. The dream includes a community center with a shared office and

meeting room. There may be lease space for businesses like a daycare, an industrial kitchen, or cafe. A communal library, recreation space, kitchen and eating area could offset smaller home sizes and enhance economic opportunities for the whole community.

"If everything goes well, Habitat will hold two design competitions and a discussion series to help determine the green systems. Other plans include trying to fund green-housing rehabilitation and breaking ground on the first Habitat home in Questa."

"We are truly grateful to all our volunteers and contributors, locally and worldwide," Hensch said. "You have provided tremendous support during the past 12 years, but the need for Taos Habitat housing is great and we could use more local

participation." Habitat Taos is rebuilding contributions, local volunteerism and service organization participation that waned in the last few years. Donations can include money, property and materials for building, as well as new and gently used items to be sold at the Rotors. The Rotors can use just about anything except clothing, and anyone can stop or donate.

Habitat would also like to build monthly pledges of money time — a Habitat Habit. Next time you're wondering how to make a difference, stop by the Habitat project behind the Taos Youth and Family Center and just do what you can.
